The functional diversity of mammals has allowed them to play critical roles in every ecosystem, whether marine, freshwater, alpine, tundra, forest, or desert. Many mammal species are critically endangered and present complex conservation and management challenges. This book touches on those challenges, which are often precipitated by overharvesting and habitat loss, as well as emerging threats, such as the impact of wind

turbines and white nose syndrome on bats and chronic wasting disease on deer. Among the updates and additions to the fourth edition of *Mammalogy* are numerous new photos, figures, and cladograms, over 4,200 references, as well as
